### Good Striking

As most of you know I am computer illiterate, so imagine my surprise when I was away at Christmas and my eldest grandson bounded down the stairs, from the computer room where else, and announced "Grandpa you are famous, you are on the Internet". Suspecting that my wife was carrying out her threat to get rid of me by selling me on e-Bay, I leapt up the stairs on my recently replaced right knee and there it was on the Cheltenham Branch Website: by the retiring Ringing Master Mike Clifford, "Let us make striking in our Branch the envy of the Association" or words to that effect. How easy to make these throw away remarks but how

Over the last three years I have given talks about ringing to 1552 people from various groups. Although their knowledge of ringing has been virtually nil, the question most frequently asked is "Why do the bells all sound jangly at times?" You see the general public has no idea whether you are ringing call changes or Gobbledegook Surprise Maximus, but they do know when the striking is not good.

I know that striking is always receiving the attention of Branch Officers but maybe a few observations from someone who has been forced to take a back seat for a while, but has had the opportunity to observe how others ring, might be helpful.

Responsibility for good striking <u>rests on all of us</u> and we must always do our utmost to achieve it.

We must accept three things:

difficult to put them into practice.

- 1. There are some people who although able to ring several methods will never be good strikers due to a lack of coordination.
- 2. We cannot all be experts like the College and Cumberland Youths in our midst.
- 3. Some experts must take this into account when setting standards for loyal Sunday Service Ringers. Shouting at people and constantly picking them up during ringing is unhelpful and usually means the striking gets worse as people become unnerved.

In my opinion the reasons for poor striking are:

- 1. Poor bell handling/control.
- 2. Failure to learn a method properly before trying it out.
- 3. Not looking at others, especially when dodging or leading.
- 4. Not listening for your bell in the ring.
- 5. Being too grand to be corrected, or too sensitive.

Now to take the reasons in order.

 <u>Handling</u>: Failure to teach proper bell handling from the start is a major problem as bad habits picked up during teaching are almost impossible to correct at a later date. I have seen several cases where ringers are being held back because they look for the sally every time. How can they look around to see where they should be when they are doing this? The responsibility for teaching handling must be on a proper basis from the start. It would be helpful if each Tower could have someone responsible for this or bring in outside expertise if necessary. Tower Captains have too many other responsibilities and it would be beneficial if the load could be shared.

- Methods: Learn a method properly, by which ever way suits you best, before you try to ring it. A glance at the book on practice night is insufficient. <u>Remember that even practice night is a public performance</u>. For Sunday Service ringing attempt only something which most of the band are capable of ringing correctly. Do not try to be too clever.
- 3. <u>Looking</u>: When ringing look around to see the bell you should be ringing after/over. When dodging look for the bell you should be following when dodging under; just as important as the one you ring over/after.

Do not look at the floor or the ceiling as so often happens, you will find no help there. Remember that a smile to someone who is unsure can be very helpful.

When ringing with no tenor cover, look for the last bell to take your lead and do not rush; a common fault.

4. <u>Listening</u>: I am not one who agrees with ringing masses of rounds before you start a method. My experience is that even if you spend ages getting the rounds right it still generally goes pear shaped when you start the method.

Use the time of rounds to detect if your bell is striking late or early so that you can drop it into the correct position at every stroke. Try to pick out your bell from the others so that you will hear if you are not striking correctly. This is not always easy but essential if you are to strike well.

It must be appreciated that those with a hearing impairment, who are often loyal members of the band, will find difficulty with this and allowances must be made for them.

5. <u>Finally</u>: For the very few who consider themselves too grand to be corrected I would just say, "think again, none of us are perfect".

To the over sensitive, remember a mistake has to be corrected quickly and people have to speak loudly and abruptly if the ringing is not to fire out.

Remember that while we all make mistakes most ringers always try to do their best. So let us all spend a little more time and patience helping the weakest members of the band to improve by *encouraging* them.

# H M Queen Elizabeth II's 80th Birthday

On 21<sup>st</sup> April Quarter Peals to celebrate H M Queen Elizabeth II's 80<sup>th</sup> birthday were rung at Bishop's Cleeve (Plain Bob Doubles), Cheltenham Parish (Grandsire Caters); Leckhampton (Rutland Surprise Major), St Christopher's (Plain Bob Doubles), and Winchcombe (Grandsire Doubles).

# St. Mark's Bell Restoration Update

"On Monday 18<sup>th</sup> July during practice at St Mark's the tenor headstock suddenly failed resulting in a rather dramatic end to ringing. Cracks up to 8 inches long and half an inch wide have opened up causing the stock to bow and the bell to drop.

The bells have been inspected by Malcolm Taylor and Simon, and the Tenor has been declared unsafe. It is currently still hung but has supporting timbers in place under the bell in case the stock should fail completely.

The remaining 4 bells will continue to be rung for service and weddings in 2006 (pending no further problems) however several cracks in other headstocks and some bearing problems were noted during the inspection. The remaining bells will fall silent within two years. This appeal has now become all the more urgent, with progress so far:

- Now raised £32k, over 40% of total project cost of about £80,000
- Successful with 5 grants (one local charity giving £5000 their biggest ever grant)
- Treble bell has been given
- The DAC have approved the bell restoration faculty.

Still to go:

- Faculty for restoring the west end balcony as a ringing room is under discussion, result hoped for by September
- Awaiting outcome of G & B Grant application
- Applications being made to big grant giving bodies including Sports and Arts, Heritage Lottery, Barron Bell, Gloucestershire Historic Churches Trust, ENTRUST to name a few. The Diocesan funding officer has taken an interest in the project and is offering his services for free!

Up coming events:

- Concert with St Mark's own specially commissioned piece, with a nationally recognised choir.
- Heritage weekend in conjunction with St Mark's.

- Sponsored peals and quarter peals in October festival week
- Another open day on 14<sup>th</sup> August 2007. Please put the date in your diaries. All requests to: ahajok@worcestershire.gov.

A recent event raised £375 (after expenses). The committee would like to thank all those who supported this event and particularly Janet and Hilda who kindly helped us with the ushering and organisation.

It is hoped to begin the work (which may in itself take one year) at the end of 2007 or beginning of 2008.

Simon would also like to ask if anyone is willing to help accommodate a homeless local band for a while. St. Mark's now have several learners who are beginning rounds and need to keep up their "rope time". If anyone is willing to accommodate a practice on a Monday or offer bells for learners please do get in touch.

Many thanks for your support, real progress is being made in this very complicated project.

# Alf French

Most of you will have already heard the sad news that Alf French of Twyning has died.

Alf became a member of the G & B at Twyning in 1983, was awarded a proficiency certificate in 1986, and served as Ringing Master of the Tewkesbury Branch in 1991. He rang in 3 G & B peals, all of which were Minor.

"He built some of the early ringing simulators in the days when computers were not generally available. The first was used by Twyning tower. He subsequently built a simulator for the G & B, specially designed for simplicity in use. It was portable and was aimed at training learners in the basic methods.

The G & B simulator was a masterpiece of electronic design. He must have spent hundreds of hours in adapting the electronics and in re-writing the software. It remained in use in various towers until overtaken by advances in PC technology.

After retirement he assisted professional bellhangers by providing voluntary labour during restorations, a valuable contribution in keeping costs down." HNE
